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



4945 Coon Dog Cemetery Road; (256) 412-5920, (256) 320-7955 More than 300 coon dogs have been laid to rest in the scenic "Freedom Hills." Unique headstones and epitaphs pay tribute to man's best friend. "Troop" was the first dog buried here in 1937. Call for burial information.Open daylight hours year round. No admission.

🖵 Jesse Owens Museum (H-11)

Dedicated June 1996 with the arrival of the Olympic Torch enroute to the Atlanta games, The Jesse Owens Museum & Park is a tribute to the life and legacy of Jesse Owens, track and field great, who captured four Golf Medals at the Berlin Olympics in 1936 shattering Hitler's Aryan supremacy theory. Jesse's athletic and humanitarian achievements are depicted through interactive kiosks, displays, a rare documentary narrated by Owens, memorabilia and a museum store. The park includes a Sharecropper Birth Home Replica, Bronze statue, 1936 Olympic Torch Replica, interactive Broad Jump Pit, Olympic Gold Medal Tree, picnic pavilions, ball fields, basketball court and a playground. Indian Mound & Museum - 1028 S Court Street; (256) 760-6427. A middle woodland period platform mound – largest in the Tennessee Valley. Hours: Tu-Sa 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Admission.

Kennedy-Douglass Center for the Arts - 217 E Tuscaloosa Street; (256) 760-6379. A complex of historic buildings serving as a center for cultural activities. Galleries provide annual and rotating exhibits. Hours: M-F 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Free.

Pope's Tavern Museum - 203 Hermitage Drive; (256) 760-6439. The one-time stagecoach stop, tavern and inn, was used as a hospital by Confederate and Union forces during the Civil War. The upstairs museum houses an extensive collection of Civil War artifacts. Hours: Tu-Sa 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Admission.

W. C. Handy Home, Museum & Library - 620 W College Street;

(256) 760-6434. Contains the most complete collection in the world of the personal papers and artifacts of the "Father of the Blues." The hand-hewn logs in the cabin are original. Hours: Tu-Sa 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Admission.

Frank Lloyd Wright Rosenbaum House - *601 Riverview Drive; (256) 718-5050.* The only Wright designed structure in Alabama. The house is an excellent example of the Usonian style and contains furniture designed by Wright. Hours: Tu-Sa 10 a.m.- 4 p.m., Su 1-4 p.m. Admission.

Natchez Trace Parkway (A-5-F-2)

This 444-mile All-American Road and National Scenic Byway follows an ancient trail carved through woodlands by animals and the moccasins of Native Americans. From Nashville, TN to Natchez, MS, the Parkway connects three states. In Alabama there are interpretive sites for history, nature, bird watching, hiking, biking, boat ramps, picnicking, and camping. Just off the Natchez Trace in The Shoals area (Florence, Muscle Shoals, Sheffield and Tuscumbia), you'll encounter plenty of Alabama visionaries such as the birthplaces of Helen Keller and W. C. Handy, at the Frank Lloyd Wright designed Rosenbaum House, at the Alabama Music Hall of Fame and at FAME Recording Studio.

Wheeler was a U.S. Congressman following the Civil War. "Fightin' Joe" Wheeler became a national symbol for reunification and reconciliation following the Civil War and throughout the latter half of the 19th Century. Admission rates are \$8 for adults, \$5 for Seniors, college students, military, \$3 for children 6-18, and Free for children under 6 years old. Past-Times, LLC - "The Overton Farm"(H-3)

Past Times LLC was organized by John L. (Bo) Williams and Sharon Hindman Hester for the purpose of rejuvenating property known as "The Overton Farm" located in Hodges, Alabama and using that property as an event venue. Abner Overton, a tobacco peddler from North Carolina, and his wife, Judy Mae, purchased 160 acres on Bear Creek in 1817, two years before Alabama became a state. Overtons lived on and worked the land from that time until it was purchased by the Tennessee Valley Authority in 1969 as a part of the Bear Creek Water Control Project. The Bear Creek Development Authority (BCDA) is charged with maintenance of the property and has leased the same to Past Times. The property still contains the Overton homestead, Overton Cemetery, two (2) 1800's log cabins, modern dorms, and a dining hall. Past Times is working diligently to get the property ready for a public opening for various events beginning Spring, 2022.

{HOUSTON}

Houston Historic Jail (K-11)

Circa 1868, the jail is the oldest such structure in the state and the second oldest in the country. Houston was the first county seat of Winston County, which was named in honor of the first native-born Governor of Alabama, John Anthony Winston. Open Daily - Free.

Dawson Distillery (D-8)

Dawson distillery is the first legal moonshine operation in Northwest Alabama since prohibition! Our moonshine family legacy began on an old dirt road in the foot hills of North Alabama with the oldest mountain spring water around which supplied the oldest known dwelling east of the Mississippi river known as LaGrange rock shelter. It is registered as a national historic site. Come see us for a tour of our distillery and have a taste of the best handcrafted moonshine in the Heart of Dixie! Monday -Friday: 9am - 5pm Saturday: By appointment Sunday: Closed.

LaGrange College Site Park (D-8)

1491 LaGrange College Rd.; (256) 446-9324; www.lagrangehistoricsite.com On January 11th, 1830 LaGrange college opened with enrollment of 70 male students and became the first state-chartered College in Alabama. Located on a spur of the Cumberland mountain off Alabama Hwy 157 in the East Colbert County at 1491 LaGrange College Rd, Leighton, Alabama the site was listed on the Alabama register of landmarks and heritage in 1976. Since 1998 the LaGrange Living Historical Association has maintained the site by opening the site to tourism, educational classes, and established three funds raising events; Recall LaGrange in May, Haunted Hay Rides in October, and Christmas in the Country in November. The Log Cabin Pioneer Village now located on the site serves as a Chapel, B&B Inn, welcome center, 1800 kitchen, country store, barn, and smokehouse, observatory, and picnic pavilion welcomes visitors daily to the site. The home is named after Judge William Rush Jackson, who later owned it. The venue is available to rent for weddings and other functions.

Established in 1959, FAME was the first successful, professional recording studio in Alabama. Arthur Alexander's 1961 hit, "You Better Move On," cut here, launched the famous Muscle Shoals Sound. The internationally acclaimed documentary, *Muscle Shoals*, released in 2013, and told the story of FAME, has sold over 350 million copies worldwide. It remains a working studio and continues to attract major recording

Birthplace of Helen Keller - Ivy Green (D-6)

The site is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The old "whistle path" carries the visitor to the outdoor kitchen from the main home. Sprinkled around the estate are the Lion's Club's International Memorial Fountain, the "Clearing" and herb gardens, the Carriage House and Gift Shop. Helen Keller's birthplace cottage is situated east of the main house and consists of a large room with a lovely bay window and playroom. The cottage and main home contains many of the original furnishings and items pertaining to the life of Helen Keller, America's "First Lady of Courage." Of particular note is Helen Keller's complete library of Braille books and her original Braille typewriter. Hours: M-Sa 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m. Admission.






