What does Amy (from Suwanee) know about events?

- Suwanee has a population of just over 22,000
- 1 of 16 cities in Gwinnett County, the largest county in Georgia
- Host about 45 ish events each year.
- In 2005 we hosted 22 events. I started working part-time in 2005. (17 plus years of experience!)
- 20 private events people rent the park and host and plan their own event.
- 5 co-sponsored events with radio stations, media outlets and art opportunities.
- 20 city events (concerts, farmers market, Halloween, Holiday, and Suwanee Fest).
- SFEA Kaleidoscope Award winner for a whole bunch of stuff.
- Named the 2020 Event Director of the Year by SFEA (and then shut down every event for 18 months).
- Georgia Downtown Association Event of the year, 2022.


