




ITINERARY

What to See and Do off of I-22 in North Alabama

I-22 serves as a Birmingham to Memphis expressway, cutting across rural areas in northwestern Alabama. As you drive the stretch through North Alabama, it may appear rural, but there are plenty of things to see and do, so stop, stretch and explore! We believe the experience will have you returning for more visits.

Must See Stops:

Bankhead National Forest and Sipsey Wilderness

Bankhead National Forest features 181,230 acres containing bluffs, canyons, waterfalls, springs and lakes. There are nine recreation areas scattered about the Forest, each offering a unique experience of its own and there are over 90 miles of recreational trails. Kinlock Falls is located along Hubbard Creek and offers a magnificent view and an area where people come to swim. Turkey Foot Falls is just a 30-minute walk from the Sipsey River Picnic Grounds and Recreation Area and is a popular waterfall for pictures. The Sipsey Wilderness, Land of a Thousand Waterfalls, lies within the Bankhead National Forest and is home to Alabama's largest tree, a tulip poplar with a 21-foot circumference at its base.

Dismals Canyon

So much adventure is waiting at Dismals Canyon. This attraction is a National Natural Landmark and offers hiking in pristine wilderness. There are dozens of grottos, two waterfalls, six natural bridges and giant moss covered boulders strewn. Come for a summer night tour on Saturday evenings when the canyon lights up with tiny creatures called Dismalites. These "glowworms" require a select habitat to survive and are unique to only a few places on Earth. They are "close cousins" of the rare glowworms found in Australia and New Zealand. Circa 1868, the jail is the oldest such structure in the state and the second oldest in the country. Lewis Smith Lake

A regular stop on the Alabama Bass Trail, Smith Lake is located approximately 20 miles northwest of Birmingham, is the holder of five previous World Record spotted bass catches and highly rated in the state as a trophy saltwater striped bass fishery. The current lake record is 45 lbs. A deep, clear lake with feeder streams, bays and sloughs, it is also popular for weekend getaways where boating, skiing, wakeboarding, paddleboarding, swimming and cliff jumping are all on the agenda. It has 21,000 acres of some of the cleanest and deepest lake water in the United States and over 500 miles of beautiful tree-lined coastline.

· Looney's Amphitheater Complex and Cultural Center

The Complex includes a 1500-seat outdoor amphitheater and a 300-seat indoor theater and hosts cultural events, music shows and stage plays. Call for schedule.

Natural Bridge

Natural Bridge Park features a 148-foot sandstone bridge that towers 60 feet above winding pathways, and it's the longest natural bridge east of the Rockies. The park has a picnic area perfect for bringing a lunch to eat before or after you hike the approximately two mile trail through the park. At the back of the park is a small waterfall, and there is a stream that runs throughout the park. During the spring, you'll find all kinds of wildflowers, and in the fall you'll see the vibrant fall foliage. Under the natural bridge is a cave-like bluff for exploring. This natural bridge formation dates back to two million years ago, and it is known that the Creek Indians lived in the area. Don't miss the Indian face that's etched by nature in the large rock! The park also features a great gift shop that has local products as well as products from all over the United States. Admission charged. • Rickwood Caverns State Park

What makes Rickwood Caverns State Park unique is the massive cave that contains 260-million-year-old formations that were created by water and reveal evidence that the cave was carved from an ocean bed. Along with guided tours of the cave, the park offers an Olympic-size swimming pool fed by chilly waters from the cave, picnic area, hiking the Fossil Mountain Hiking Trail, playground, gemstone mining, camping and a gift shop. Sipsey Vineyard and Winery


















Must See Festivals:

Springfest

The popular Springfest transforms downtown Guin into a venue for free family fun, attracting thousands of visitors to the wholesome North Alabama community. For two days, festivalgoers are treated to live music, games, a dog show, 5K race, barbecue cook-off, car show and plenty of good food. Hosted by the City of Guin, the event is typically held the second Friday and Saturday in May and takes place in downtown Guin at "the square." Free admission.

Arley Day Festival

The Arley Day Festival brings colossal fun to the small North Alabama town with a day filled with free, family-friendly activities. Typically held the third Saturday in May, the one-day event is a celebration of the town of Arley, the heart of Smith Lake, complete with a parade, car show, arts and crafts vendors, games, horse rides, food trucks and more. Coalfest

Each year during Memorial Day weekend, the North Alabama community of Brilliant pays tribute to its roots in the coal mining industry with a free festival filling the downtown area with two days of family fun including live music, games, a look into the coal mining days, activities for children, arts and crafts and more. As music fills the air, festival goers can learn about the early history of coal mining in Brilliant with a guided tour of the historic Train Depot located in City Park. Brilliant Methodist Church, located on Main Street, will also be open for tours. A stop on the North Alabama Hallelujah Trail, Brilliant Methodist Church was built by local coal miners and remains an iconic cornerstone of the town. Free admission.

• 911 Festival

Over fifty years ago, the first 911 emergency call was made in the United States and the call was placed in the North Alabama town of Haleyville. In celebration, the town hosts a two-day festival offering activities for kids, street vendors, a parade, live music, antique tractor show and more. Always first Friday and Saturday in June, activities are held in downtown Haleyville. Free admission.

• Carquest Mural

Downtown across from Courthouse, Hamilton

• Freedom Eagle/United We Stand

Gourd artist and muralist Missy Miles of Hamilton painted Freedom Eagle, also known as the United We Stand mural, as a tribute to veterans.

• Game Time / Deer

415 Bear Ave W, Hamilton

Painted by gourd artist and muralist Missy Miles of Hamilton. In addition to murals in Marion County, her work can be seen in Fayette, Lamar, and Jefferson counties, as well as four in the city of Jasper.

• Greetings from Guin

US Highway 43, Guin

The Guin AL-MCHS Class of 2023 designed this community public art project. Digital art was done by Gracious Webb and Muralist Missy Miles was commissioned to paint their design which incorporates landmarks, schools, waterpark, a fountain and 3-M.

• How Electricity Gets to Your Home

3196 County Highway 55, Hamilton

Painted by gourd artist and muralist Missy Miles of Hamilton, this mural is located in the lobby of Tombigbee Electric Cooperative and can only be viewed during business hours.

• Pigs

1717 State HWY 17, Hamilton

Local artist Misty Miles painted the flying pig mural at a locally owned barbeque restaurant, J & V Ole Smokehouse. The patriotic lettering is a tribute to the owner's late son who was a member of the National Guard.

• R. W. Harris and Son

956 US Hwy 43, Winfield

The mural is located on a large, two story brick building that houses the R. W. Harris store. The building, built in 1885, has its original copper framed windows, and the inside of the building is a virtual museum of the late 19th and early 20th century.

Painted by gourd artist and muralist Missy Miles of Hamilton, the mural is a tribute to the Webster family who have been in the grocery business over 50 years.



• Kinlock Falls

Located along Hubbard Creek in the Bankhead National Forest, Kinlock Falls is a cascade waterfall that drops 15 feet over a span of 20 feet. Though Kinlock Falls is not a high waterfall, it features a magnificent view, along with being an area that people come to swim.

• Mize Mill Falls

Mize Mill Falls is located in Bankhead National Forest. This enchanting area is covered in luscious green moss and evergreen trees. There are two ways to get to the falls but no official marked trail. One is a difficult, short hike and the other is a moderate 2-mile round trip hike. Turkey Foot Falls (listed below) is downstream from Mize Mill Falls and worth a stop!

• Parker Falls

Parker Falls, located in Bankhead National Forest, is a 4-mile round trip moderate hike. There is no official trail to Parker Falls, but typically has a worn path. Along this hike, the trail meanders through a beautiful pine forest and passes several beautiful waterfalls before making it to Parker Falls.

Rainbow Falls

Located in northwest Alabama, Rainbow Falls is nestled in a small canyon known as The Dismals, featuring two waterfalls, many various rock formations, and a 3/4-mile trail through the canyon. Dismals Canyon is a National Natural Landmark and is noted as one of the finest examples of ecological and geological features composing our nation's natural history.

Shangri-La Falls

Located deep in Bankhead National Forest is a beautiful waterfall surrounded by luscious green trees, falling into a gorgeous pool of blue water. The hike is three miles roundtrip and is moderate for most of the hike. It can be difficult getting into and out of the canyon. This waterfall is seasonal and the best time to visit is in the winter or spring.

• Sougahoagdee Falls

Located in Bankhead National Forest, this waterfall is a four-mile round trip moderate hike. There are no official trails to Sougahoagdee, typically there is a worn path. The hike to this waterfall follows striking cliff faces and a beautiful nearby river. Along this hike are several other streams and waterfalls.

• Turkey Foot Falls (pictured on cover)

Turkey Foot Falls is a 30-minute walk from Sipsey River Picnic Grounds and Recreation area in Bankhead National Forest. Turkey Foot Creek runs through a sandstone canyon then empties into the Sipsey Fork. The area is rich in Native American and pioneer history.

• White Creek Falls

White Creek Falls is located in Bankhead National Forest and is a difficult 5-mile round trip hike. White Creek Falls has an upper and lower waterfall. The upper waterfall is a shorter waterfall with a unique heart-shaped pool also known as the "Valentines Pool." The lower waterfall is much taller and settles into an impressive canyon.
